### **WAWOKIYA PROJECT**

This year has been marked by dedicated efforts to provide essential support to our community members, strengthen partnerships, and enhance our services. Wawokiya remains committed to addressing the challenges faced by vulnerable populations, continuously exploring new avenues for client support, and staying engaged in professional development and community initiatives.

Through this period, we received a total of 36 referrals, and our commitment to addressing these needs resulted in 22 of these referrals being accepted for ongoing support. Additionally, for the remaining 14 cases, we conducted brief interventions to address immediate concerns and offer guidance.



Over the past year, Wawokiya celebrated several successes. One client successfully completed Family Enhance the closure of their CFS file. Another parent managed to retain custody of their children due to the support systems in place. Two clients completed probation files, and multiple clients saw a reduction in their calls for RCMP services, indicating positive progress.

With the introduction of a new coordinator in August of 2022, the training process began promptly. Wawokiya engaged in many community events, solidifying our presence and knowledge-sharing. The Wawokiya Coordinator has been actively engaged in enhancing her knowledge and skills through various training sessions and workshops. These include Indigenous land-based training on medicines and practices, a workshop on "Leading Through Change," and sessions on topics such as Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) and crime prevention.

### **WAWOKIYA PROJECT**

During the winter months, Wawokiya observed a notable increase in community members seeking support due to rising food prices and hydro rates. This prompted us to intensify our efforts to ensure that individuals and families in need received the assistance they required. In the face of urgent food security concerns within our community, Wawokiya swiftly responded to the challenge by leveraging an emergency food grant of \$50,000 from the Government of Manitoba Department of Families. This barrier-free program served as a lifeline for individuals and families experiencing immediate food insecurity, allowing us to make a tangible impact and demonstrate our commitment to the well-being of our community members. We were able to partner with local business RealFood to distribute food boxes to these families.

Throughout the year, Wawokiya actively participated in numerous meetings and events, such as the Annual MCMSI Meeting (Manitoba Community Mobilization and Safety Initiatives), the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness conference, and engagement with the Manitoba Harm Reduction Network. We also conducted several support team meetings with our clients



to ensure their needs were met comprehensively. Wawokiya partnered with Communities Building Youth Future to organize a Youth Mental Health Summit, offering workshops and wellness information to young people in the community.

Wawokiya's commitment to community well-being, professional growth, and collaboration remains unwavering. Our achievements, partnerships, and ongoing efforts demonstrate our dedication to creating a stronger, more supportive community for all.

## AFFORDABLE RECREATION & IMPROVED FACILITIES

From April 2022 to March 2023, the PCRC hosted and partnered on 30 free events and neighborhood initiatives in Portage la Prairie which engaged all community members. This year has seen a revitalization of in-person events as we move into a post-COVID time period. Many of these events are being held for the first time in several years.

#### **Beautification Days**

Beautification days are held bi-annually in the spring and fall. This year we had a total of 968 people participate in the spring clean-up and 440 for the fall clean-up. We had multiple schools participate in a clean-up of their grounds



along with businesses, committees, and other organizations.

#### Touch-A-Truck

The Annual Touch-A-Truck event, held at the BDO, had over 400 people in attendance. This event was held in partnership with the City of Portage la Prairie as part of Public Works week. This event had a free BBQ and allowed for educational discovery on the variety of vehicles that were provided by local businesses and organic



#### **Second Harvest**

PCRC has become a partner community organization with Second Harvest and through this program we have rescued over \$16,000 worth of food. This food has been allocated to over 26 organizations, businesses and schools in our community.

#### Graffiti Removal

The Green team was employed throughout July and August, they removed 35 graffiti tags from city, private and residential buildings and performed targeted clean ups at local parks and community spaces. The Green Team also assisted with other organizations such as the Soup Kitchen, Fort la Reine Museum and the Family Resource Centre.

#### **Painting on the Crescent**

Two walkways were painted on the crescent, one for Every Child Matters and an Anti-Racism mural. This artwork was completed by 25 individuals and the goal of these paintings is to bring further awareness and public attention to these issues.

#### Winterfest

This annual event was expanded this year to an entire week of events. The kick off was held at La Verendrye School and included bouncy castles, live entertainment, dog sleds, snowshoeing, bannock cooking, free hot dogs, hot chocolate, cookies and more! The week of events included a PLAP birthday cultural tea, a family

Bingo, skate on the lake, reduced fees for a swim night, a week-long scavenger hunt and a free movie night. Over 1500 people attended the events throughout the week.

March Recreation – "Beat the Blahs" Event

In partnership with the Family Resource Centre and Personnel Support Programs, PCRC hosted two free recreation events in March- a bowling night and a swim afternoon. These events were full on the first day of registration, highlighting a need in our community for more recreational activities.

#### **COMMITTEE EVENTS**

Sexually Exploited Youth Committee- This committee hosted three events over the past year; the Grandmother's walk, the Sisters in Spirit Paint Night and the Sisters in Spirit March. In total approximately 90 participants were part of these activities.

Portage Active Transportation

Committee- The committee has mostly been idle for the past several years due to COVID, but has started to take on new projects including planning for a full bike week in May 2023, erection of bike repair stands (fall 2023) a new location and vision for the Greasy Chain.



Communities in Bloom- For the first time in 2022, Portage la Prairie hosted the National Communities in Bloom judges. The judges were present for a two-day tour of the city with over 10 organizations participating in the tour. As a result of the tour, the judge's awarded Portage la Prairie with special recognition for the recently complete Causeway. Additionally, Portage la Prairie participated in the Manitoba Communities for Bloom photo essay contest and were subsequently picked as a winner.

**COMMUNITY EVENTS** 

#### **Gardening Workshops**

In early spring, we hosted three garden workshops which focused on small container gardening, herbs and composting. These workshops were very well attended with approximately 90 community members in attendance.

#### **Equinox Feasts**

This year through various grants and donations we were able to partner and host both a spring and fall equinox feast. The Fall Equinox Feast was a take and go meal pick up from one of two locations in Portage and this event provided approximately 230 people with a hot meal, bannock and dessert. The Spring Equinox was an in-person event and included a meal, crafting activities (beading etc.) and entertainment (Spirit Horse Drummers) with meals being provided to 220 people.

#### **Cultural Events**

PCRC participated in September 30th activities through selling of orange shirts, organizing the September 30th March and assisting with activities which took place at the National Indigenous Residential School Museum. Over a thousand people participated in the days events which included speeches, singing,

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dancing as well as a public participation blanket ceremony.

#### **Holiday Events**

Skate with Santa and Mrs. Claus- This annual event was held at the BDO (Ice time was donated by Simplot). We had both Santa and Mrs. Claus in attendance and were able to utilize skates from the FRC for children who did not have equipment. Over 50 participants were in attendance and enjoyed the visit with Santa as well as free hot chocolate.



Parade of Lights- For the first time ever, PCRC participated in the Annual Rotary Parade of Lights. This event was possible through the generous donation from Meseyton Construction Ltd. of a truck, trailer and driver. PCRC staff handed out candy canes while promoting the Reaching Home

Program.



Holiday Cookie Decorating- In partnership with CBYF, a free holiday decoration workshop was offered. This event has been quite well received by the youth in our community and continues to be a highlight holiday event.

#### **Make and Take**

Bird Safety Kits- These kits were created and assembled by a student working in collaboration with Canada Service Corps. Over 50 kits were distributed free of charge to the community.

Culture Days take home Kits- These kits were provided as part of Culture Days. There were two age levels of crafts to provide appropriate difficulty levels for children. One hundred kits were provided.

Grow Together Program- provided seeds and pot kits to 145 children.

#### **Trick or Treat Tour**

The highly anticipated Trick or Treat Tour was held in partnership with the

Portage la Prairie Regional Library and Family Resource Centre. This event was the most successful to date with over 1000 people in attendance. Approximately 15 businesses and organizations (Fire Dept., Southport, Co-op, Friendship Centre etc.) also participated by offering treats to the attending children.



#### **Election Event**

In advance of our local election, PCRC held an election event which was attended by 16 of the 17 candidates. Over 125 citizens attended the informal venue to speak with candidates about their concerns and to ask questions about their current campaigns.

Mascot

In 2023, PCRC publicly promoted our mascot "Ajidamoo Aki" (ground squirrel). To introduce him to the community, a colouring contest was held and winners received a visit from Ajidamoo, as well as a healthy snack. Ajidamoo Aki has attended several PCRC events and has been well received by the community and partnership organizations.



#### **Vaccination Support**

PCRC continued promotingCovid-19 vaccinations along with Flu shots and held events at the Family Resource Centre Outreach location along with the Bear Den. There was weekly transportation offered to the community to make getting to a pharmacy or public health more accessible. There was cultural support offered as part of this along with food support.

## AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT

**Community Roots - First Time Homebuyers Program:** 

Affordable Housing Funding that was received from the province obtained by the city then allocated to the PCRC, the Community Facilitator assisted with the implementation and community presentations for the Community Roots Program. The first successful applicant purchased a home in December 2022. The Community Facilitator also provided support for extensive research and planning for the Affordable Housing Build.

In July, The Community Facilitator assisted with the Communities in Bloom National Judging Competition.

The Community Facilitator also assisted a community member with fundraising for Wheel Chair Accessible Swing (cash calendar draws and grant applications).

The Community Facilitator also played a major role in the Zoongide September 30 Truth and Reconciliation Mural Ceremony.



The Community Facilitator was actively involved with the Spring Equinox, which hosted over 160 people. The Community Facilitator also helped out at the Youth Mental Health Summit. The Community Facilitator organized the Canada Day BBQ for the Parks Committee Fundraiser. (\$3000 raised)

# COMMUNITIES BUILDING YOUTH FUTURES (CBYF)

Communities Building Youth Futures has emerged throughout the eventful year of 2022. The past year witnessed the expansion of CBYF's reach and impact across the community.

Expansion: CBYF's net has expanded over the community in the last year. We have held major events and made many partnerships while continuing to get our name out and make relationships with youth in the community. Roving Campus CIF 4: Over the summer we also secured a \$55,000 Community Innovation fund grant from Tamarack to support the expansion of the Roving Campus project into a second grade 10/11 classroom.



The Roving Campus teaching staff and PCRC/CBYF partners are focused on timely barrier reduction without judgment. Many of the students joining Roving Campus are dealing with the realities of poverty. Two of the key barriers are transportation and meals. We have found that this is key to supporting our students. This includes building lessons that are cross-curricular and responsive to student needs and interests. All activities and lessons are purposeful to meet curricular outcomes, engage students and leave them with useful skills they carry forward. At the start of May through our Roving Campus grant project we hired a Youth Support Navigator to help Roving Campus students and graduates navigate barriers and support students outside of the classroom.



# COMMUNITIES BUILDING YOUTH FUTURES CONT.

In June we hosted a variety of Qmunity Events for Pride month, along with a flagraising at city hall and painting a progress pride flag on the crescent walkway. We also hosted 2-staff from Tamarack, who fund the CBYF project for a visit in June. Funders Visit: Also, in October we had special visit from the co-CEO of Tamarack and a representative of anonymous donors who were interested in learning more about the work that CBYF does in Portage la Prairie.

The visit was a whirlwind day and was a huge success; near the end of the day the representative stood up at our community leader lunch to share that this visit had been a highlight of her 24-year career and she would consider Portage la Prairie to be a gold standard for community collaboration in western Canada.

Youth Hub Planning: The community conversations around the Youth hub proposal that we worked on, in partnership with the Family Resource Centre, continued and by the time the proposal was submitted it had 18 letters of support and we had hosted multiple engagement sessions with stakeholders and local youth to put together a comprehensive application

Innovation Centre Launch: We launched our innovation fund project in September, the Portage Innovation Centre with the Innovate



to Launch weekend where local youth worked with mentors and had workshops on making their business idea a reality, and they all pitched their ideas at the end of the event to a panel of youth judges.

# COMMUNITIES BUILDING YOUTH FUTURES CONT.

Job fair: In October the CBYF Education and Employment action group hosted a 2-day job fair and conference at Red River College that had over 25 employers and 12 workshops. The event had about 400 total attendees. CBYF was also focused on engaging youth in the municipal election, both through supporting youth candidates and also hosting a 'Speed Date Your Candidate' event put on by the CBYF youth council, comprised of local 15-30-year olds. Although no youth candidates won seats, this was still a historic election to see such young people (18, 19 and 20) running, and also seeing youth-led election events.

We were also able to share copies of the guide with our leadership table and action group members and to speak at the PLPSD guidance staff meeting to present the guide and collect their ideas for future projects.

Youth for School Board: CBYF was also focused on engaging youth in the municipal election, in October, both through supporting youth candidates and also hosting a 'Speed Date Your Candidate' event put on by the CBYF youth council, comprised of local 15-30-year olds. Although no youth candidates won seats, this was still a historic election to see such young people (18, 19 and 20) running, and also seeing youth-led election events.

Youth Council: In April, we saw our youth council officially launch with an in-person meeting for the youth to be introduced to CBYF and for the council members to get to know one another.

Mental health summit: As a collective impact initiative, we know that this work cannot be done alone so we approached every project with a partner in the community and centered sustainability and learning. The CBYF team co-hosted the Youth Mental Health Summit, which with Wawokiya. The event was very successful and we got very positive feedback on it from some of the 65 youth that attended the full day of speakers and activities.

### REACHING HOME

Through April 2022 - Mar 2023, here are some of Reaching Home team's impactful efforts over the past year. From community engagement and partnerships to training initiatives and support services, the team's commitment to addressing homelessness and providing assistance has been evident throughout.

Community Engagement and Fundraising: The quarter began with the team's active participation in various community events, an out-of-province conference, and valuable training sessions. A highlight was the successful launch of the Flocking Flamingo Fundraiser. This unique initiative not only raised funds for the Reaching Home Program but also engaged the community by offering them the opportunity to "flock" yards with pink lawn flamingos. The campaign's success led to increased awareness and support for the program's objectives, as well as donations to help unhoused folks in their journey to housing.

Additionally, the team's engagement in a garage sale fundraiser and their role in the Table for 600 event illustrated their dedication to creative fundraising approaches.

Indigenous Support and
Partnerships: In May, the team
welcomed a new Reaching Home



Community Auntie, dedicated to providing specialized indigenous support for clients. This addition highlighted the program's commitment to serving diverse community needs. Community Auntie worked in collaboration with the Indigenous Senior's Coordinator to aid in come and go teas for seniors. Some of the Reaching Home clients were able to attend a "Survivors Gathering" in Winnipeg which was very impactful for the participants. Community Auntie also keeps food pantries stocked when funding allows.

# REACHING HOME CONTINUED

Community Involvement and Support Services: Active community involvement remained a core part of the team's efforts which included participating in the Anti-Racism March and collaboration with events such as the community potato giveaway, same day Vaccine Clinics, The September 30th Orange Shirt Day Event, and the Youth Mental Health Summit. The team set up flamingos at Freight Night at the Museum for awareness and collaboration. Reaching Home also contributed to Men's Shed by cohosting the nights with colleagues.

Reaching Home offers transportation to community members for these events, and any time we are able to support our clients. Food security remains a high need throughout our community, and through funding we were able to keep the community pantries stocked, and help many families and individuals get access to much needed food with as little barriers as possible.

The team's collaboration with Second Harvest allowed them to secure and distribute food donations to 26 local agencies. The successful distribution highlighted their resourcefulness and dedication to addressing food insecurity within the community. Reaching Home's involvement in the STBBI testing event and partnership with the Manitoba Harm Reduction Network.



Learning and Progress: The team actively pursued learning opportunities including effective communication strategies, opioid poisoning response training, and understanding food labels for food waste reduction. The team participated in the Alberta Community Crime Prevention Association Annual Conference and hosted an instructor for the Homeless Individuals and Families Information System (HIFIS), as well as became CPR certified. The team was able to participate in a blanket exercise at 4 Winds cultural Centre.

# REACHING HOME CONTINUED

Through the 2022-2023 year, there was 58 people housed by the Reaching Home team. This consisted of both private rental placements and affordable housing. the majority of these client remain housed in their placements and have been connected to other resources. This was triple the amount of clients housed from the previous fiscal year, highlighting both the need and capacity of the program has grown. The team has built relationships with landlords and helped clients who were at immediate risk of eviction. Being able to stay or attain housing has meant that program participants have been able to focus on other goals and move forward in their wellness journeys.

Reaching Home continues to work closely with many local agencies by receiving referrals and speed tracking clients when need be. Their commitment to serving vulnerable individuals, improving their well-being, and addressing homelessness-related challenges has been consistently evident over the 2022-2023 year.





# INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY COORDINATOR

Urban Indigenous Strategy still continues to facilitate monthly PUIPC meetings. The coalition consists of community organization leaders, Elders and Knowledge Holders. The Urban Indigenous Strat Manitoba urban Indigenous Coalition on a monthly basis. These meetings provide updates, as well as sharing ideas for new programs! projects and funding opportunities. UIS staff attended the Urban Indigenous National Coalition in Ottawa in March 202 PUIPC has also been transferring their strategic plan engagement version- PATH (Planning Alternative Hor



PUIPC has also played an active role with the guidance and assistance of projects and programs funded by Indigenous Community Support Funding (Federal) \$78,000. Some of these projects and programs supported Mental Health/Wellness and Food Security for our Urban Indigenous Community.

PUIPC also was fortunate to be the recipient of the Government of Manitoba, Indigenous Relations and Northern Reconciliation Funding (\$25,000). This funding was utilized for Spring Equinox Gathering Indigenous (over 160 people attended) Land-based Training Event, Winterfest (Tipi Teachings) and creating an Indigenous Welcome Billboard for our community.

PUIPC has continued to collaborate on numerous projects and programs with many community organizations, such as the Portage Friendship Centre, Family Resource Centre and the Portage la Prairie School District. PUIPC has also established a strong connection with surrounding First Nations Communities, and is currently working with Long Plains First Nation on a transportation project.

PUIPC also nominated an Urban Indigenous Community Member, the late Renata Beaulieu for the last Queen's Platinum Jubilee Award. Renata Beaulieu played a vital role with our Indigenous Language support and our Urban Indigenous Vaccination Clinic.



# INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY COORDINATOR

PUIPC and PCRC staff participated in setting up a tipi on the grounds of Red River Polytech in creating a cultural space for Tipi Teachings to schools and the public. The tipi remained in front of Red River for the summer.

On June 8th 2022, a Blanket Exercise was given by the Portage School Division and PUIPC to 65 participants from various organizations and held at Four Winds Cultural Centre.

PUIPC also participated in National Indigenous Peoples Day and Anti-Racism Week. The Mamahtawisin Presentation was given on June 9th, Mamahtawisin meaning the wonder we are born with), these teachings will be implemented into the Manitoba

education system in September.

PUIPC took part and organized many events during this period. Some events PUIPC assisted with the July 1st Canada day celebrations, First Nation Celebration Days, Communities in Bloom Tour, Potatofest, and I Heart Heritage Festival-Fort la Reine Museum. PUIPC supported events such as Circles for Reconciliation, Southern Chiefs Organization Status Card



Clinic, Education for Reconciliation, Winterfest, National Urban Gathering of Coalitions and the BiBoon Ziigwan Spring Equinox.

As part of PUIPC's public education on Reconciliation, various organizations and schools have requested sharing circles and smudge ceremonies. The Portage Learning Literacy Centre, The Roving Campus (PCI), Westland Insurance and McCain's have all participated in sharing circles and smudge teachings in September. A smudge ceremony was also provided to Southport Aerospace 30th Anniversary celebrations.



#### Truth and Reconciliation Week:

A proclamation and flag raising ceremony was held at City Hall in recognition of Truth and Reconciliation Week in Portage la Prairie. An honor song was given and opening prayers held. Opening remarks were given by Acting Deputy Mayor in recognition of the week and remarks by Executive Director of the National Indigenous Residential School Museum. An honor song was held as Every Child Matters flag was raised.

In our efforts in working towards
"Reconciliation", the Portage Urban
Indigenous People's Coalition continues
to public educate. Our work continues in
reconnecting the teachings of the Ojibway,
Cree, Dene, Metis and Dakota languages.
The above is a Dakota Proverb and utilized
as the "word" the day throughout the
month on Mix 96. We will continue to find
creative

ways in relearning the language. PUIPC also participated in the walk for the Sisters in Spirit Vigil.



#### Overview

Over the previous year, the Portage la Prairie Local Immigration Partnership (PLIP) successfully executed numerous community initiatives that significantly impacted the cultural, social, and interpersonal fabric of Portage la Prairie. These initiatives ranged from community surveys and reconciliation programs to



cultural festivals and youth development projects. Collectively, they epitomized PLIP's enduring commitment to fostering an inclusive and vibrant community. The organization not only opened avenues for conversations on pressing societal issues but also laid the foundation for genuine relationships between newcomers and long-term residents.

### **Community-Wide Survey**

Initially, PLIP administered an extensive survey across the community. The aim was to probe into the state of social connections in Portage la Prairie. The feedback garnered provided valuable insights that informed our strategies to




encourage a more robust community spirit.

#### **Circles for Reconciliation**

PLIP then concluded its role in the Circles for Reconciliation project, in collaboration with members of the Manitoba Government. This initiative significantly contributed to cultivating understanding and respect between Indigenous and non-Indigenous residents of the community.

Anti-Racism Week

Last year, PLIP was delighted to host its second annual Anti-Racism Week. In doing so, we collaborated with several community organizations, including the Portage Regional Library, the Portage School Division, and more. A wide array of activities such as a scavenger hunt, human library speakers, and a cricket exhibition match were conducted.



The city formally issued a proclamation in support of the week's activities, and we were immensely grateful for this recognition.

### I Heart Heritage Festival

In partnership with the Fort la Reine Museum and the Portage Learning and Literacy Centre, PLIP supported the annual I Heart Heritage Festival. A perogie pay-by-donation event was particularly noteworthy, with all proceeds supporting Ukrainian resettlement.

Outstanding Contribution by a Newcomer Award
Finally, in November, PLIP, in conjunction with the Portage Ia Prairie
Chamber of Commerce Business Awards, initiated the "Outstanding
Contribution by a Newcomer" Award. The inaugural award was proudly
presented to Oleksandr Hrynsiv for his exceptional contributions to the
community.

Holiday Gathering Hosted by PLIP and the Immigrant Advisory Table

December was a month teeming with activities and events aimed at enriching the community spirit. PLIP, in association with the Immigrant Advisory Table, organized a Holiday Gathering featuring guest speaker Kari McClusky from Aurora. The focus of her talk was on mental health and well-being, emphasizing the importance of self-check-ins and resilience. The event was graciously hosted at the Portage Library, where a special appearance was made by Mrs. Claus. A children's corner was also set up, bustling with activities ranging from crafts and games to reading, singing, and dancing. Additionally, attendees shared a communal meal. The gathering was well-received, with 32 newcomers and their families gracing the event.

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**Tour of Portage la Prairie by Ukrainians** 

PLIP also took a pivotal role in preparing for a tour of Portage la Prairie by a Ukrainian delegation. We developed publicity materials and committed to funding one of the buses used during the visit.

#### **Canadian Tire's Jumpstart Program**

The organization also secured \$14,900 in funding from the Canadian Tire's Jumpstart Program. The funds were utilized to buy cricket equipment and host a nine-week cricket program for children aged 6-17. A total of 30 children registered, and each participant received a t-shirt, snacks, and invaluable coaching sessions.

#### **Malanka Celebration**

In January, the PLIP was thrilled to host a vibrant Malanka celebration that drew a crowd of over 200 community members. This event was not just a celebration of the New Year according to the Julian calendar; it was a testament to our core belief that community is the answer to any issue. The Malanka celebration served as a platform to empower citizens, enhance our neighborhoods, and foster community spirit. Through events like Malanka, PCRC continues to build the capacity of community organizations and create a stronger, more connected Portage la Prairie.

**Newcomer Swim Safety** 

This summer, the Portage Ia Prairie Local Immigration Partnership was proud to partner with the Portage Learning and Literacy Centre to launch a swim program specifically designed for newcomers to our community. The highlight of the program was a special beach day, conducted in collaboration with the RCMP, focused on beach safety. This event drew a diverse crowd and was in perfect alignment with our mission to empower citizens and build community capacity. The RCMP's involvement provided invaluable safety tips and demonstrations, ensuring that everyone can enjoy our local beaches safely

### INDIGENOUS SENIORS RESOURCE COORDINATOR

Over the course of this period, the ISR Program was decided to the well-being and cultural enrichment of indigenous seniors' lives. A significant component of this was the initiation of Indigenous Seniors Gatherings in collaboration with Community Aunty in September 2022. These gatherings served as a platform for individuals to indulge in social interaction and cultural enrichment within the Portage community.

Though the first gathering started with 12 attendees, the momentum of these gatherings gained traction, with successive events drawing a diverse attendance of 42 unique individuals, many of whom became repeat participants. Notably, these occasions featured guest speakers who introduced a range of programs and resources tailored to the unique needs of the indigenous senior demographic.

The ISC Program is also set up to help indigenous seniors with chores around the home. The ISR Program was able to help several seniors with their snow removal in the winter and lawncare in the summer months. The ISR Program was contact by two teachers working at Portage Collegiate Institute and asked to share specific indigenous knowledge that was related to what the students were learning. Through this engagement the ISR Program was able



to connect youth with indigenous elders. One indigenous elder from the monthly gatherings was also brought into the same classrooms to share her own cultural knowledge. This partnership led to the assembly of Grieving Bundles.

The program's active involvement in growing a knowledge base was helped along by attending numerous conferences organized by Wa-say Healing Centre with program clients who would not normally have the opportunity to attend events like this.



# INDIGENOUS SENIORS RESOURCE COORDINATOR CONTINUED

Evident through collaborations with entities like Roving Campus and the

Portage Friendship Centre, the ISR Program consistently sought to engage the community. The program was actively involved in events like the Zoongide mural unveiling, the Reconciliation Week Flag Raising, Orange Shirt Day, Fall Equinox Elders Luncheon, Spring Equinox Luncheon were emblematic of the program's dedication to nurturing cultural awareness and honoring historical memory.



A recurring element of the program's engagement strategy was the organization of regular smudging sessions at diverse events and locations. Beyond giving moments of reflection and cleansing, these sessions highlight the program's commitment to nurturing spiritual well-being throughout the community. Worth highlighting is the program's role in providing smudging information sessions at McCain's Foods, Westland

Insurance, and with two groups part of the Portage Learning and Literacy Centre.
